

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Mr Vincent Zwelibanzi Mntambo

Mntambo's early career includes lecturer and later senior lecturer positions at the then University of North West (UNW), the University of KwaZulu Natal (UKZN) and the University of South Africa (UNISA) where he inspired many students in the fields of Constitutional Law, International Law and Jurisprudence.

His problem solving and negotiation capabilities guided him in successfully leading the Independent Mediation Service of South Africa (IMSSA), an NGO which specialised in the resolution of industrial conflict. In that role he led the establishment of a division which helped resolve community and political conflicts in the period leading up to SA's democracy in 1994.

He subsequently served as the first Director General of the Gauteng Provincial Government where he left an indelible mark as a people-centred change leader.

On the business front, Mntambo's success track record includes being founder and Director of Sediba Consulting, Eyesizwe Mining and Exxaro Ltd. His other chairmanship roles included the Commission for Conciliation, Mediation and Arbitration; Eyesizwe Mining; Metrobus; South African Tourism, and the Paleontological Scientific Trust. His qualifications include B.Iuris; LL.B (UNW) and LL.M (Yale).

His interests are spread across a wide range of disciplines which include, law, public service management, business leadership, education, conflict resolution, tourism, nature conservation, history, the creative arts and the origins sciences.

VUT CELEBRATES THE INSTALLATION OF ITS CHANCELLOR WITH GREAT OPTIMISM FOR THE FUTURE.

On o6 June 2024, the Vaal University of Technology (VUT) celebrated the installation of its new Chancellor, Mr. Vincent Zwelibanzi Mntambo, a renowned business leader. Graced by dignitaries from academia, business, and government, the event was celebrated in two parts; the official installation at the Desmond Tutu Great Hall on campus, followed by a luncheon at the Riverside Sun Hotel in Vanderbijlpark.

Mntambo, who will be the institution's titular head for the next five years, was appointed by the University Council on 11 September 2023 after careful consideration and an extensive nationwide search for a suitable candidate fit for the role.

Speaker after speaker, Mntambo was described as a man of integrity with a deep sense of dedication to social development and an unwavering commitment to education.

Chairperson of the VUT Council, Professor Mandlakhe Radebe who presided over the installation, said Mntambo's appointment comes at a critical time, pointing out that VUT and the sector at large had been in the limelight for not so good reasons in recent times. He also added that Mntambo's distinguished background positions him as a dedicated ambassador for VUT, who would advocate for its interests and enhance its brand visibility on national and international fronts.

Expressing confidence in Mntambo's leadership, Radebe said: "Your vision, Mr. Chancellor, aligns perfectly with our commitment to bridging the gap between academia and the broader society. Together, we will work towards creating an inclusive environment where every voice is heard, every talent is nurtured, and every dream is given the chance to flourish."

In his inaugural speech as Chancellor, Mr. Mntambo stated that he was humbled to take on the mantle of Chancellor for VUT, which he said has for long been shaping young minds. "VUT is a place that has given birth to ideas, where the futures still are to be forged," he said, adding that he embraces the university's motto

The keynote address was delivered by Chairperson of the Thabo Mbeki Board of Trustees, Ms Geraldine Joslyn Fraser-Moleketi, who was elected to SA's first democratic parliament in April 1994 where she served in the Executive and Cabinet. Currently the Chancellor of Nelson Mandela University (NMU), Fraser-Moleketi started by welcoming Mntambo to "the club" saying that VUT is fortunate to have a man of his calibre as Chancellor. Reciting former President, Thabo Mbeki's famous "I'm an African" speech, Dr Fraser-Moleketi said it actually reflects and captures Mntambo's love of being an African.

Other speakers included Advocate Leah Qcabashe SC from the South African Judicial Services.

Taking to the podium to give acknowledgements, Prof Khehla Ndlovu, VUT Vice Chancellor and Principal, said eh day was of great significance to VUT, highlighting that the University had been without a Chancellor for a while. He also emphasised that as VUT embarks on this new chapter, it was important to spare a moment to appreciate the legacy of our past Chancellors: Mr Tokyo Sexwale, Advocate Pansy Hlakula and Dr Xolani Mkhwanazi, saying they laid the important building blocks for this thriving University of Technology. "Mr Mntambo, I have no doubt that these great giants have left a solid foundation during their respective tenures, on which you can stand firm as you take over the reins. Let us honor their contributions and pledae to build upon their legacy with renewed vigor."

Ndlovu further said Mr Mntambo's credentials speak for themselves, and he has no doubt that his Chancellorship will be nothing short of exponential growth for the institution. "Your forward-thinking vision for the country's higher education aligns perfectly with the core values of our university and complements our dedication to making knowledge and learning accessible to all, as well as fostering young leaders who will advance societal interests through technological innovation, excellence, and inclusive growth. We look up to your elevation and consummation of your relationship with our institution with great expectations and optimism for the future," he said.

To add grandeur to the event, attendees were treated to live performances from the VUT Choir, award-winning musician, Brian Temba as well as Musical Expressions Ensemble by Classics of Turf.

I stand before you today with a profound sense of humility as I take on the mantle of Chancellor of this esteemed institution. The Vaal University of Technology has its roots in the Vaal Technical School which was established in 1966. It has been, over these many years, a crucible where young minds have been shaped. *Inspiring Thought. Shaping Talent*. as your motto proudly proclaims!

It is a place that has given birth to ideas, where the futures still are to be forged. Vice Chancellor, members of Council and Senate, I accept the responsibilities of this investiture because of my deep belief in the transformative power of education. Today, as we look towards that horizon of endless possibilities, I invite us to free our minds and explore the liberation that knowledge, creativity, and boundless innovation can bring.

The freedom I invite you to consider is not a type of unbridled irresponsibility. It is the type that is in line with the reality of our optimal performance as human beings. However uncomfortable the reality, we see that the human spirit thrives on challenge. It is through the refining discomfort of constraint, that the strength, the resilience, and the brilliance of the human mind are forged.

Consider what I have just said in these terms:

Far beneath the earth's surface, under conditions of immense pressure and heat, carbon atoms are forced into a crystalline structure, transforming into precious and raw diamonds. This process is a powerful metaphor for our lives and our academic journey. The pressure, the heat, the constraints, are not merely obstacles - they are catalysts for transformation, driving us towards endless horizons of brilliance and fortitude.


Standing as we are in a university of technology it is perhaps appropriate to relate this concept in technical rather than geological terms. Technology is often associated with computers, algorithms and the like. Some grand computing machines which have become ubiquitous in our lives today are the first thing which comes to mind when we hear the word technology. We take for granted and often forget, that all of us carry the most powerful super-computers man never made! It sits just above our necks...

It remains to this hour, the most puzzling thing we humans carry around. There is the chance that the species known as mankind may possibly not discover and fully explain the deep secrets and complex algorithms that this somewhat under-utilised organ called the brain is capable of.

Yet today, we make song and dance over something we call AI - Artificial Intelligence. What I do find interesting is that half the world is frenetically trying to study, understand, deploy, and gets regularly terrified of AI, which as we say is definitely artificial...but we then go on to IGNORE the most complex supercomputer man never made - the brains and minds we lift up from the pillow every single morning! That's what we do. Us, humans....!

In the early days of AI, the pursuit of artificial intelligence seemed boundless. Researchers envisioned machines with the unfettered cognitive capacity of the human brain, capable of solving almost any intellectual problem. However, this approach led to a conceptual dead end. Without a framework, without

Where the mind is without fear and the head is held high Where knowledge is free Where the world has not been broken into fragments By narrow domestic walls

Where words come out from the depth of truth Where tireless striving stretches its arms towards perfection Where the clear stream of reason has not lost its way Into the dreary desert sand of dead habit

Where the mind is led forward by thee Into ever-widening thought and action Into that heaven of freedom, my Father, let my country awake focus, these early AI systems floundered because Intelligence does not exist in a vacuum.

For Al to truly learn and interact with the world, it needs a body, a set of constraints, a way to experience and act within its environment. Think of it like this: a newborn baby's mind is a vast, uncharted territory. But it's through interacting with the physical world – touching, grasping, seeing - that the child learns to differentiate, create categories, and understand cause and effect. The novel developments and breakthroughs we see in Al today, are simply trying to create what already exists in us - outside of our physical and mental selves. What Al is doing is to simply express most of its rather limited capabilities - to do the things that we mostly have and could perfectly do ourselves - if we decided to use half of our brain power.

Now, Al enjoys increasing freedom to empower us in numerous ways:

- Self-driving cars that sense the environment and make real-time decisions enhance personal mobility and transform transportation.
- Al-powered medical diagnostics accelerate disease detection, saving lives.
- Robots working alongside humans in factories increase efficiency and allow us to focus on more creative, higher-value tasks.

The story of embodied AI teaches us a profound lesson: Sometimes, true freedom emerges not from boundless possibility, but from thoughtfully chosen constraints. One of the boundless possibilities we need to attend to is how we use our brains and how we free our minds.....

Our academic pursuits aim to confront or embrace this challenge. The discipline, the rigorous study, and structured learning, may seem like constraints. Yet, it is these very elements that hone our minds, that prepare us for the moment when we leave the comforts of an academy such as VUT to venture into the real world into the University of Life. Many a young graduate or diplomate do not realise that true education starts when the you get gowned and capped. Those symbolic acts are not merely a recognition of academic achievement - they are but a marker, a rite of passage into a world where real education will happen because education does not stop on the graduation stage.

Our presence here in Vanderbijlpark, is significant in its symbolism. The individual after whom this town is named navigated the path from constraint to freedom. There is significant inspiration to be found in the story of Dr. Hendrik van der Bijl, an illustrious figure whose legacy illuminates not only Vanderbijlpark but also the annals of South African history. His academic pursuit in Physics, Mathematics and his groundbreaking research in electrical engineering, were underpinned by a disciplined approach to learning and exploration.

Dr. Van der Bijl's acceptance of a national advisory role, transitioning from an engineer to a visionary architect of South Africa's industrial foundation, underscores the profound impact of a mind freed by purposeful education. His leadership in establishing Eskom and Iscor laid the groundwork for the nation's industrial growth, showcasing how a free, enlightened mind can envision and execute projects of monumental significance beyond the scope and mere fixation of the movement of electrons.

FREEDOM and constraint are not opposing forces but complementary facets of growth. Our academic and ethical frameworks provide the structure within which true innovation and freedom of thought can flourish.

Dr van der Bijl was not just a man of steel mills and power lines, he ignited the belief that electrons knew no prejudice, that progress flowed through veins of all colours. He could for all intents and purposes, be regarded as the founder of Eskom, Iscor and the IDC. He was the principal architect and first chairman of all three of these solid institutions which endure to this very day. So, when you next switch on a light bulb, think of what legacy VUT can bequeath the many generations still to come. His legacy is that of a man who was instrumental in wiring a nation, not with dogma, but with volts of possibility when the mind is free.

Despite the dogma of the time, we now stand in a South Africa that embraces his belief in technology and innovation as forces of unbiased good. It's a call to each one of us to contribute to a legacy of enlightenment, to shine a light in the dark places of ignorance and to harness our collective intellect for the betterment of society.

The lasting legacy of light, the flow of currency through the veins of South Africa's industry, regulating the heartbeat of our economy and the steely backbone of much of our politics and physical infrastructure, was built through what appeared to be insurmountable constraints of the time. Legacies such as those of Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Dr. Hendricks van der Bjil become possible when the mind is free.

As I assume the role of your Chancellor, I extend an invitation to you all—students, faculty, and the wider university community—to join in the many noble pursuits of a university such as ours, with free and open minds.

Let us answer for ourselves the question posed earlier: Could it be that there is a new kind of a much needed freedom? What is that freedom? Where could we find it? What could we do with it? *IThank You.*

Good morning everyone. Let me just remove the elephant from the room. You've all seen these very tall men who have come ahead of me and I think there's a need to turn this thing around because if I stand up here, I'll even be taller than all of them. Let's just turn around a little bit, thank you. So that's to just avoid the microphone hitting me at the middle of my nose, but I don't feel any less tall than anyone else.

Good morning everyone. I will acknowledge our Chancellor of VUT and say congratulations to you and I stand on all your acknowledgements of everyone present in the room who should be acknowledged. Our presiding officer, if I can call it that, has sort of warned me that I should try and stick within time. I'm not sure if anyone said anything strange about me to you, but I will abide. So, I cut out all the acknowledgements, but that doesn't diminish the role of either faculty or the leadership of the student body or anyone else for that matter.

Congratulations and welcome to this club of chancellors. I thought, listening to your input and also from a common road and journey that we followed, that probably I should bring another chancellor into the room. And that's someone who's a figure in history, in African history. I do so because one of your loves is also history, and you see yourself as a historian of sorts as well. And I thought, along with the illustrious figures that you had mentioned, I turn to Ahmed Baba who was one of the greatest African intellectuals of the 16th century. He was a prolific writer and Islamic scholar and his works included a number of opinions, including that on slavery, and a number of biographies of famous jurists. Timbuktu's Institute of Higher Learning and Islamic Research, which houses some 30,000 manuscripts and is one of Africa's most important collections of historical chronicles and scholarly texts, is named after Ahmed Baba. There is also a crater on the planet of Mercury named after him. He remains a national icon in Mali today and is recognized across the world. Some of his works, especially in mathematics, have been drawn on by some of the outstanding universities in France.

I cannot claim that as a Chancellor, I am quite of the ilk of Ahmed Baba, but I thought as we heard a reflection of your history and road that you followed and your question today of is there new freedom, I thought I should bring in a memory of a chancellor who represented the best in Africa, and we probably need to look at how we can draw back on that.

As I do so, I want to take you back, Chancellor, to "Nil Desperandum" - Never Despair. That was the motto of Musi High School in Pimville, Soweto, where you cut your teeth in education. If your brother, the Reverend Teboho Moleketi, was here today, which he probably is in some way, he would have reminded you of a saying by your uncles, I believe, who said, "If there's not a song written in your name, write your own song." I'm paraphrasing that. I think today, in terms of that journey that started out in Pimville, and Pimville is one of the oldest townships in the southwestern townships of Johannesburg, it's one that you can look at and think of even before 1948 because that township is more than 100 years old. You'd think of it in terms of grit, in terms of informal settlement that eventually transformed in some way into a township with four-roomed houses. From those very beginnings birthed a number of people



who are associated with our democracy and probably a new kind of freedom, including the likes of successful businesspeople like the Chancellor Mntambo, founder of Exxaro.

When he was reflecting on what this area is associated with and that it's not only about the fumes, I'm not going to go on and reflect on other fumes that may be there, but also just state that in line with that newfound and new forms of freedom, it's also his involvement not just as a founder but as a board member, present day, to look and work from a governance perspective, an oversight perspective in the development of strategy to say, "What does the future look like?" So, there's also striving for the future.

Let me just say about the other luminaries that came out of Pimville, and let me boast a little bit. So, I know you, but I also married someone who comes from that township, and in that reflect on the fact that that township, as I said earlier, bore politicians, musicians, sportspeople. I think the ones who are really recognized are sportsmen rather than women, so we need to look for the women who may not have been mentioned at the time. Academics, poets, and you can name so much more.

As I conclude on the township, I want us not to forget PUBS - the Pimville United Brothers. I see many nodding their heads when they think of PUBS. Maybe the alums of the township should see whether they can revive PUBS, and then we don't need to support Pirates any longer, and we go towards another one.

In essence, I conclude that part of my speech by quoting President Nelson Mandela, Madiba, when he said, "It is not beyond our power to create a world in which all children have access to a good education. Those who do not believe this have small imaginations." Close quote. I think this is precisely why I took you on this little journey, because those children who came through education didn't have small imaginations, neither did their parents. We want this center of learning to not be impeded by small imaginations, but actually birth the big ideas, the innovative ideas of what's required to transform our country.

I'm going to go to a second part, and don't worry, I'm going to try and stay within the time required. As I move on to that, I want to share with you - and we have the CEO of Exxaro in our midst today, Dr. Nombasa Tsengwa, who can attest to this. We went on our strategic planning session as Exxaro to the Eastern Cape last year. As we were traveling in a vehicle between venues, going out to one of the sites where Exxaro, through Synergy, has the wind turbines, we were given a lecture on terrestrial biomes in South Africa. I think some people in the car sort of felt a little bit awkward, thinking, "What exactly is biomes?" Fortunately, there's a thing called Google, and now you can even do it on others, and very quickly, we tried to join into the discussion about the eight biomes that are there in South Africa the grassland, the savanna, and so on. I can go on, but you'll check the rest. One thing that the Chancellor, our fellow board member, always tries to remind us is around the importance of biodiversity. The issue is that when you travel across South Africa, the most remarkable change in biodiversity is what you see when you're ready to look.

So, even as I was driving on, I believe it's the R52 - is it the 51, the road we were coming on? R59. I sort of looked and thought, just in case the Chancellor asked me what biome did I cross, I thought, "Let me look and try and locate it," and I thought it was, it is the grassland, you know, the bit that's there, amongst others. Actually, the savanna, or, well, one of the two. I know that in Gauteng, it's either the grassland and or the savanna.

But I thought that I'd take this biome and actually say that as there may be eight as it relates to biodiversity, we could also equate it to our lives. In this instance, as we congratulate Chancellor Mntambo, we equate it to - let's call it biomes in terms of the different journeys of his own life. There are many to be said, but I think that's for another time.

I'd want to conclude today in the spirit of the biomes because it struck me as I was rereading and listening to the "I am an African" speech that it actually reflects and captures your love for being an African. Owing to a degree your being to the hills, the valleys, the mountains, and the glades, the rivers, the deserts, the trees, the flowers, the seeds, and the ever-changing seasons that define the face of our native land. Those were the words of President Thabo Mbeki, and I think it so captures the beauty of our country. As we consider this freedom, remember we owe it to all that, but above all, as this generation, we should defend the legacy of the future for the young and the other beautiful ones yet to be born.

MY REFLECTION AS CHANCELLOR:

History is often shaped by exaggerated hopes. It can also be shaped by exaggerated fears and moments of despair. The future of VUT is likely to be shaped by any of these and other factors.

The academy has these choices to make: to build a great future and a lasting legacy or submit to defeat.

We live in challenging times. As Yuval Noah Harari writes:

"Centuries ago human knowledge increased slowly, so politics and economics changed at a leisurely pace too. Today our knowledge is changing at breakneck speed, consequently, we are less and less able to make sense of the present or forecast the future".

Studying history, looking back to where we come from, aims to loosen the unfortunate grip of the past which seeks to stunt the spirit of triumph and resilience.

He goes on to say:

"Movements seeking to change the world often begin by rewriting history, thereby enabling people to reimagine the future".

What is critically important though, is for all who make these histories, to do so not with the aim to perpetuate the past, but to do so in order to oftentimes be liberated from a tortured past.

The flawless preparations and proceedings of my investiture as Chancellor the next on June 6th confirmed that the institution has strengths to build on. There is a strong sense of belonging.

An enduring sense of community, of self pride and want to do well. These are strong elements to build on.

I had no doubt as I delivered my inaugural address, that here is a place which everyone calls home; home for those inside and far beyond the walls of Desmond Tutu Hall. A community of people who have faith and resolve to build a legacy and a brighter future for VUT.

This community centered around this academy, has the privilege and freedom to reimagine that future and sign up to the art of the possible!

I once more, wish to thank all those who turned the day into an auspicious and joyful occasion.
