Message from Executive Director.

tudents, Colleagues, Ladies and Gentlemen, Greetings to

To our students, I wish to congratulate each of you, first on having secured your university place and second, for having the good sense to choose to study in the Vaal University of Technology (VUT). The VUT puts the student at the center of everything it does; your experience here at VUT and your success is important to each and every member of staff who works here. Your arrival at university marks a new chapter in the story of your life. But this chapter is a bit different. The preceding chapters were largely written by others, i.e. your parents, guardians, families, teachers and the like.

Now you will be the principal author of the next chapter, you have the opportunity to determine the direction, the plot and the tempo of your story. This can seem as daunting as it is exciting, as challenging as it is empowering. But the great thing is that you are doing something that you have chosen to do, not something that was chosen for you by others. And while you are here at VUT you will have the opportunity

to learn new things, acquire new knowledge, develop new skills, and enhance your personal attributes in profound ways that will equip you for life after University. At the same time, you will make new friends who will become your friends for life, with whom you will share memories of your VUT days for many years to come.

aving said the above, I wish to share three pieces of advice with you:

1. TAKE RESPONSIBILITY FOR YOUR LEARNING

Up to now, most of your learning, and indeed your life, has been very structured. The objective was clear, to secure enough points to get your place in university. You followed a quite precisely defined curriculum or programme. Now you are entering the less structured environment of the University where you will have greater freedom and the responsibility that comes with that.

You will now be expected to be more self-reliant.

You are responsible for what you do, for ensuring that you do the work that will be required of you. There will be no one to check up on you, you are accountable to yourself. Make sure you attend your lectures, practicals and tutorials, that you do the assignments and read the material advised by your lecturers and tutors. You will need to develop a study plan; go to the library; use the on-line learning resources.

And while we expect you to assume a new level of responsibility please realize that you are not alone. If you find things difficult don't run away, seek help. Part of being responsible for yourself is recognising when you need the support of others. TALK TO PEOPLE. Talk to your classmates, your housemates, your friends, etc.

We know that peer support contributes hugely to student success. And I also want you to know that there is an abundance of support services available to you. Contact your student advisor, your mentor, a lecturer or a tutor. There are learning Centres on campus – Mathematics, Science, Engineering and Technology, Writing Lab, that are there to provide specialist support if you require it. And don't forget the important psycho-social support is provided by the Student Health Centre, and the Students Counseling Services. I must also mention the First Student Experience programme that is designed to help your transition to University. Find out more about it and get involved in the activities. Most importantly, understand that while we expect our students to become self-reliant, we are here to help when that is needed. YOU ARE NOT ALONE.

1. MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR TIME AT VUT

One of the great things about university life is the range of new experiences that will be available to you. You will have abundant opportunities to flourish as a student and as a person. At VUT many of the opportunities are built into your programme while others are extra-curricular. Most of you will undertake co-operative education or practice placements as an integral part of your programme, ensuring that the world of learning is intertwined with the world of work. What you learn in the classroom is applied in the workplace which in turn gives you a deeper understanding of what you have learned in the classroom; it is an incredibly enriching experience.

2. EMBRACE DIFFERENCE

The University is a melting pot. You have come from different backgrounds and communities to pursue your ambitions as students. In a large institution it can be tempting to stick with the familiar and that is especially true with respect to the people with whom you associate. But it would be a lost opportunity to stick with your own all the time. Get to know people who are different to you. It could be someone from a different part of the country, or from another country, of a different ethnicity, a different religion, who has different views to you, or who has different interests and perspectives. You might or might not change as a person by embracing difference, but you will get a better understanding both of yourself and of those who are different to you. Knowing others and understanding others will help you develop as tolerant individuals.

And with those few words of advice I wish you every success at the Vaal University of Technology. I want you to know that the entire University community is here to support, sustain, and encourage you as you commit to study at VUT. We could not be more privileged to welcome you into this vibrant learning community. It is you who make us what we are, and we look forward to the fresh ideas and energy you bring to our campus.

Future Educators set for orientation



VUT BOOK LAUNCH!

Center for Academic Develoment (CAD) on June 9th launched their book to much appraise. The book editor, Tebogo Pitso of the Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship, Prof T Olsson of Lund University Sweden, and Prof Dzimbo, a former VUT DVC were all in attendance.

title, Contextualized Critical Reflections on Academic Development **Practices** Towards Professional Learning, is based on reflections academic development activities. The book dwells on the dynamics and complexity of professional learning and effective teaching. Prof Olsson noted that the book is mandatory reading for anyone interested in teaching and learning. He remarked, "conversations about teaching and learning are important in the academic space", he says. He states this book is an important artifact to stimulate teaching and learning conversations which these conversations consist of informed. research-based, and developmental conversations.

"The book is mainly at a local level for the Vaal University of Technology but it is intended for the public interest", he says. "The importance of the book is that it is public, documented, relatable and it's an arena of teaching and learning for many in just one book.

lacksquaresually, at personal levels as a teacher or lecturer, you're used to literature, observations are performed, you evaluate your teaching, you talk to your colleagues but to make a better impact go up a higher level from the personal and local level." This is where the book comes in, it assists individual lecturers at personal levels to become more and more scholarly which will assist them in going further and doing more systematic observations and analysis and generate their own knowledge as the participants in this book have done.

e touched on pragmatism/pragmatic teaching which refers to the teaching to students about the practical things in life and things to encourage them to do better. He also mentioned the importance of informed subjectivity and objectivity by saying we should not be afraid to be subjective but our subjectivity should be informed

In his conclusion, Prof Thomas Olsson of decolonization education which refers to the need of higher educational institutions to meet the needs of all students and staff members at large and not just a selective group, "We can learn from it, you can get knowledge from different perspectives, we can learn from each other, we don't have to learn from European and American countries but each other".


The second speaker, Prof Vuyisile Msila noted that critical aspects of the book help lecturers unmask their practice.


He further elaborates this statement by saying that most books of the same sort filled with theory whereas the difference with this book is the balance between theory and practical work and how the current COVID 19 pandemic will shape and navigate the future possibilities and dynamics of the academia especially with regards to professional development.


Prof Msila focuses more on the role that students learners play in improvement development and teaching and learning. Pedagogy, according to the Oxford dictionary - the method and practice of teaching, especially as an academic subject or theoretical concept, is also at the topic as Prof Msila mentions that pedagogy preaches the involvement from students so they get to become part of the learning process which is seen as critical and emphasis in all these chapters is learning more than teaching.











"What I like about many of these chapters is that they seem to be seeing the students as cocreators of knowledge rather than people who sit in the lecture halls to receive from the faculty members who are teaching".

rof Msila differentiates between change and transformation by stating that transformation requires new kinds of thinking about values and how they are expressed and about how work is organized. Therefore, transformational learning refers to learning that shapes people making them different afterward in ways that they and others could recognize.

According to Prof Dzvimbo, "In the new normal of the academy, we different strategies reauire understanding the functions of knowledge as a material discourse practice as we teach, as we interact with students, as we interact with other academics that teaching and learning must become a material discourse in practice."

He suggests that the book elaborates on how in all the chapters, the academic space is a "core constructer" of knowledge in and outside classrooms as well as virtually, and it creates imagined structures that enable both student and staff to interact at a particular conceptual level and that learning is fundamentally experiential and fundamentally social and this has enhanced by the deleterious the COVID impact of pandemic.

touches on epistemic knowledge, which refers to "a involving dispositions. beliefs, and skills regarding how individuals determine what they know, versus what they believe, doubt. or distrust". influences learning and reasoning amongst students and academics. He further says this book encourages us to come up with social epistemology.

In conclusion of the launch, Biki Pitso hinted more conversations must be had about the book.
